Eyes Up: The "Other Driver"

Track driving season is here and thoughts are focused on prepping the car, remembering everything you did correctly last season, and, if you are honest with yourself, things that you need to work on.

Tangential hint: if you ever have trouble falling asleep at night, try running through the track (or tracks) in your head. I am talking eyes-closed visualization here. Turn-by-turn, entry, apex, and exit, braking, throttle transitions. It is kind of like counting sheep in that it shifts focus away from all the day's work and other clutter in your head. And, it works better than counting livestock or, depending on your flexibility and extent of years of dedication, trying to twist your body into some Zen-like pretzel and chanting ancient mantras. Try it. After a few laps, you will be out...or if you are still awake at least you have been doing something more constructive than sheep tallies.

But I digress. The topic of this Immer installment is the "other driver."

At track events you have probably heard instructors tell you to get to know the other folks in your run group. In particular pay attention to and learn how they drive and behave on track. Predictability is the key and your level of trust in the "other driver" needs to be on the low end of the scale initially until you learn otherwise how they behave.

How do they enter, apex, and exit a corner? How do they brake, how smooth is their transition to throttle, how do they accelerate? Are they a "drop anchor" early in the braking zones and then "point and shoot" down the straights driver, or do they brake late and carry momentum through the turns? How do they react in traffic?

Of course you have listened diligently in the classroom and to your instructor and know what to do when and where and why at least in principle, and are working on the ever adjusting transition from principle to practice. But what about the "other driver"...?

Adjusting is part of the learning experience and entails developing the skills to make the right split-second decisions, especially when the "other driver" does not. To give you an example here, the appendices of the NASA CCR (Club Codes and Regulations) cover sample track scenarios involving position, responsibility for accident avoidance, and "racing room" particularly in corners. Granted racing and drivers' schools are two VERY different things, but there is a takeaway that has always stuck with me.

The gist is that even though you may have the "right" to a particular space on the track it does not always make sense to try and assert that right. The "other driver" might not be paying attention, might not see you, might just assume that you will back off, or may simply try to take the space anyway and let the stewards and the folks in impound sort it out later if necessary. This leads back to the point about learning and being aware of the habits of the "other driver."

Now you might think that in a drivers' school where there are rules like "no pass without a point" and "complete all passing before the braking zone" that space is clearly understood by all and thus that the takeaway I mentioned above is not an issue.

But it can be. Consider situations when you are being passed. Do your part and keep those eyes up—pay attention to the flags and corner workers, give a clear point-by to the overtaking driver in the passing zones of your run group, and stay on the proper line. In short, do not be that "other driver."

If you are being passed on the straights by someone even when you have not given that car a point-by (e.g., with apologies to The Treasure of Sierra Madre or, for you more recent classic movie fans, Blazing Saddles: "Point-by??? We don't need no stinkin' point-by"), remember that "other driver" and be even more aware when they come up on you again.

If you are passed in the braking zones during a drivers' school (e.g., "dive bombed") welcome to a learning experience. Be aware that mechanical issues happen like boiled brake fluid, burned through pads, or blown a brake line. But there may be that "other driver" with the fast car who simply believes that they can only slow down by going deep into the braking zone no matter where your car might be.

Regardless of the reason why, you now have company where you did not expect it. The corner workers are your friends and the frantically waving flag about a faster car behind you really does mean something. Do not tunnel vision, quick check your mirrors, be predictable in your line, and be prepared to adjust speed and braking as necessary to avoid collecting each other and both cars going home on a flatbed or worse.

Once through the corner, take a breath. Congratulations, you have learned something and for the rest of the session, and in sessions going forward, you now know THAT car. But you also have to ask yourself some hard questions. Did you see this coming or were you too red-mist focused on the car in front of you and thinking about your own next pass?

Now consider situations where you are the one doing the passing. How well do you know the car you want to pass and how that driver behaves? Are you paying attention to how they point-by, the traffic behind you, the flags of the corner workers, and your track position relative to the upcoming braking zone? Are you following the school passing rules or do you think that rules do not apply because you are special and are going to "win" the HPDE session? In short, make sure that you do not become that "other driver." Until next time folks, have fun, be safe, and keep those eyes up!

2021 Track Events


